

At the time of going to press, the 2007/2008 club season is having a winter break but it will be back to delight the crowds again in February. This will surely be a highlight to look forward to in the year to come.

Celebrate the Passion

The EHF held a Handball Champions League Gala on the 29th June 2007. The event brought over 300 guests from the top handball ranks of Europe together. The evening came under the motto of "Celebrate the Passion" and marked 15 years of EHF Champions League. This was a truly unique event with the focus on the Men's and Women's EHF Champions League Group Match Draws. The evening was dedicated to the elite of club handball and its history. A Champions Award Ceremony celebrated Champions League superlatives, with awards being presented to the most successful players and clubs.

Building for the future

The summer months in the European handball year traditionally belong to the youngsters. It is a pleasure to attend the EHF Younger Age Category events, which I have the privilege to do. The vigour, energy, skill and passion that the young players show are an example to us all.

In 2007 it was the turn of the girls, who along side with the Men's 19 European Open, took part in the Women's 17 European Championship in Slovakia and the Women's 19 European Championship in Turkey. Both organisers are well experienced and it was extremely interesting to see the girls moving up the age groups and retaining their path of success: Denmark, for example, took gold once again in the Women's 19 ECh, after taking the world title in the U18 championship (IHF event) in 2006. This underlines the fact that handball is flourishing in Europe and the youngsters are getting better and better.

A place in the sun

It wasn't just the youngsters who were active in Europe this summer. The 5th Men's and Women's Beach Handball Championships took place under the sun of Misano Adriatico. The Italian Handball Federation set a precedent for this event, offering excellent event conditions in the scorching sun. The Beach Handball played was also in a class of it's own, which is sheer proof that this branch of the sport has established itself as a top class discipline for the summer months. This was underlined at the Extraordinary Congress, when it was voted to establish a Beach Handball Commission as of September 2008.

The EHF makes a point of stressing that it is not about sponsorship but partnership and prides itself on having strong relationships with long serving partners, which play a decisive role in the development of the sport. Infront, adidas, Gerflor and Nijha and other partners all play an essential part in the work of the EHF, contributing to the product placement and development on the competitive sporting market and this is of paramount importance. Euro 2008 Norway Men's Championship







The EHF European Handball Championships come under the brand name of "EHF Euro Events" and are the EHF top event on the European sporting market. Sixteen of the best teams in the world will be in Norway to fight it out for this coveted title. Very few brave to tip the winner as it could go either way; there is no doubting that only handball of the highest calibre will be seen in Norway over the course of the Championship.

The Norwegian Handball Federation was awarded the honour of hosting the 8th Men's European Handball Championship by the EHF Congress in May 2004 and preparations commenced immediately. The EHF works intensively with its long-serving Euro partners: Infront Sports & Media, adidas, Nijha and Gerflor, together with the Organiser, to create a top class event. It is a joint venture which follows a strict and target-driven timetable from the outset.

Despite the fact that the Euro Events take place in the "even" years, the bulk of the preparations for the men's event take place in the "odd" years and 2007 was no exception. Immense time and effort is invested, on the side of both the Organiser and the EHF, to prepare for a sporting event of this scale, to offer the sporting world across Europe a top class and innovative event.

The EHF held numerous workshops, inspections and meetings with the Euro 2008 Organising Committee and its partners – a proactive approach is used to plan all areas of the Championship from A to Z, ranging from the technical side of matters to event and media management.

The competition itself obviously revolves around the athletes. A special Head of Delegation Meeting was held on 5-7 October 2007. This not only gave team representatives from the 16 Euro 2008 participants the chance to view all the venues, but also to give vital input relating to the teams' technical needs and wishes.

From each edition to the next they get bigger and better with the 2006 editions of the event reaching record figures – it was the most extensively covered and viewed tournament in the history of the Men's European Handball Championship. More than 760 million cumulative viewers followed some 707 hours of television coverage of the event, which took place from 26 January to 5 February 2006.

This is one of the biggest events on the 2008 men's handball calendar and the first big Championship of 2008! The European Handball Federation wishes all the teams, officials and all those working behind the scenes all the best and good luck!







Euro 2008 Norway Men's Championship Qualification

The 8th Men's European Championships will take place in five venues across Norway from the 17th – 27th January 2008. The play-off matches came to a conclusion in June 2007 and we are now just weeks away from the start of the final tournament. Norway has risen to the challenge of organising an event of this size. For the first time, since hosting the Women's World Championship in 1999, the Norwegian Handball Federation have pulled out all the stops to set new precedents and to make Euro 2008 an event to remember!

2008 Women's European Championship in FYR Macedonia

The 8th Women's European Championship will take place in FYR Macedonia from the 2nd – 14th December 2008. An event of this magnitude has never been held in this small country and the FYR Macedonians are ready to rise to the challenge. The European Championships will be held in the Boris Trajkovski Arena in Skopje and the Biljanini Izvori Arena in Ohrid. In the final tournament sixteen teams will compete for this prestigious trophy.

From the qualification round that was played in a group system from 27th November – 2nd December 2007, the 9 teams in **bold** print have secured their places in the play-off matches and join those 11 teams who had already directly qualified for the play-offs. The play-off matches will take place across Europe with the first leg over the weekend of 31st May - 1st June and the second leg to follow on the 7th-8th June 2008.

2007 European Beach Handball Championships

The summer highlight of the handball season took place on east coast of Italy from the 10th – 15th July 2007. It was a special year for Beach Handball as the playing rhythm of the competition, based on mutual accord with the International Handball Federation, changed permanently. In addition to this change, the European Beach Handball Championships returned to its origins on the beaches of Italy.

The event saw 178 matches played over six days, with 36 teams competing for the championship titles. The new champion in the women's competition is the national team of Croatia who defeated Germany in an exciting finale. In the men's competition it was Russia who conquered Croatia to go home with the title. The Italian women clinched fifth place after winning against FYR Macedonia and gave reason to celebrate in front of the enthusiastic Italian supporters. The Norwegian women beat Russia and finished their almost perfect championship in the third place. The Hungarian men took the bronze medals after defeating Serbia on shoot-outs. An EHF Beach Handball Commission will be introduced following the 2008 EHF Congress. Their task is to pursue the development of Beach Handball. In 2009, in accordance with the new playing system introduced by mutual agreement of the EHF and the International Handball Federation in 2007, the next edition of the European Beach Handball Championships for Men and Women will take place from the 23rd – 28th June 2009 and the hosting venue will be defined at the EHF Executive meeting in March 2008.

After much intense application from all involved, the EHF is pleased to announce the introduction of a new competition within the sphere of Beach Handball. In 2008 the first European Youth Beach Handball Championships for those young men and women born 1998 or later will debut in the Nagyatad region of Hungary from the 27th – 29th June 2008.







2007 Men's 19 European Open Championship

The largest youth handball tournament took place from the 3rd – 8th July 2007 in Gothenburg, Sweden. This was the 37th edition of the tournament which began in 1970 and in the past 3 decades the strength of this competition has grown in leaps and bounds and had exceeded all expectations. In 1970, 140 teams from 8 nations convened in Sweden to play this 4 day tournament. In 2007, 39 nations spanning 5 continents provided 891 teams, a grand total of 15,500 players, who participated in 3,131 games that produced 65,007 goals!

Once again, the EHF held a parallel event that was the second official event of the summer. A total of 98 matches were played over 5 days. Each team played a minimum of 8 matches with the exception of the teams ranked 1-4 who played nine games in Valhalla and Liseberg. The finals were played out in the Liseberg Hall on the 7th July in front of a capacity crowd. This event had 24 national teams pitting themselves against one another for their chance to win the European Open Trophy. However, it was Sweden who, in front of 2000 spectators in Gothenburg, defeated Slovenia in a dramatic final to claim the European Open title. The Spanish national team put on a great performance and was overjoyed to take third place and the bronze medal.

2007 Women's 17 European Championship

The second edition of the Women's 17 European Championship took place in Bratislava, Slovakia from the 29th June – 8th July 2007. In the Sibamac Arena NTC, in front of 1100 spectators the national team of France defeated Spain to take the title of the European Champion. France was also honoured as the "Fair Team" of the competition. Number 18 from France Isaure Vigner and number 3 from Spain Ana Ferrer Prohias were awarded with the title of best players of the match. In the battle for third place, it was the team from the Netherlands that beat the national team of Russia to take the bronze medal. EHF President Tor Lian was present to declare the Championship officially over.

The W17 EURO in Slovakia was accompanied by online video streaming of the matches. As a reward for their efforts, FRA and ESP have automatically qualified for the Women's U18 World Championship (IHF Event) also in Bratislava, Slovakia from 11 to 20 July 2008.

2007 Women's 19 European Championship

Denmark's victory brought the 2007 Women's 19 European Championship in Izmir, Turkey to a close. The competition for those born in 1988 took place from the 10- 19th August 2007 and was the fourth competition of the European summer season. The Danish right wing player, Louise Knak Lyksborg, scored 8 goals leading Denmark to a 29:19 win over Spain in front of 1200 spectators in the Celal Atik Sports Hall. The two finalists have automatically qualified for the 2008 U20 World Championship (IHF event) that will take place in FYRO Macedonia.

It is the 3rd consecutive title in three summers for this team, who featured nearly the same squad that had already won the W17 European Championship in 2005 and claimed last year's W18 World Championship crown. The national team of Romania took the bronze in their match against Sweden who had to settle for fourth place. President Tor Lian and Vice President Jean Brihault represented the EHF in their official capacity during the top event.

The 2007/2008 EHF Men's Champions League Season threw-off where last season left off, with even more dynamic, fast, top-level matches. In the 2006/2007 season, the EHF Men's Champions League saw European elite club handball entering a new dimension, the objective for the 2007/2008 season was and is to keep the ball rolling and reach new heights, with record media coverage and a clean and fresh event identity, retaining a secure place on the sporting market. The EHF and EHF Marketing GmbH works together with the participating clubs and partners to continue the development with new, innovative event elements and even greater TV and media coverage.

2006/2007 season

The statistics, compiled by EHF Marketing media partner TNS Sport, reached new heights in 2006/2007. In the men's competition alone, approximately 524 hours of EHF Men's Champions League match action were shown in the 20 countries analysed, generating an audience of over 212,02 million viewers. Coverage of the EHF Champions League by TV partner Eurosport paid dividends for the placement of the product on the sporting market. The 149 live/delayed broadcasts on Eurosport 2 covered the pan-European market. Figures generated from the women's competitions also confirm the upward trend and ever increasing popularity of handball. In the 13 countries analysed approximately 233 hours of EHF Women's Champions League were broadcast, with over 190 hours of match action shown around Europe.

2007/2008 season

The EHF Champions League is and always has been the elite competition of club handball – 32 teams from 21 countries entered the group match phase of the competition. The 2007/2008 season sees a slightly different playing system with two group phases; the "group matches" and "the main round", which guarantee more matches of the top teams and satisfies the market demand for EHF Champions League Handball. The fight for the coveted title will be tight right up to the end of the season on 10/11th May 2008.

New Event Elements for 2007/2008

The EHF Champions League entered the 2007/2008 season with revised Event Regulations, with strong focus on the CL branding concept and event identity. The event identity which was launched on the market for the 2006/2007 season has been further reinforced with new elements.

EHF Champions League Flooring System

An EHF Champions League "blue and lagoon" flooring system supplied by longstanding partner Gerflor is seen universally as of the group matches, adding to the attractiveness of the product both for the viewer at home and the fan in the arena.

EHF Champions League Anthem "Hymn of the Champions"

The EHF has invested resources to strengthen the musical show element of the EHF Champions League event. The anthem comes under the title of "Hymn of the Champions" and will be played in all arenas and on TV.

TV and Media Coverage

The quality of the TV images sent around the world now reaches even higher standards. The EHF is working with highly-respected TV networks and producers to achieve this goal. A Host Broadcaster Manual has been especially amended in line with this objective and the development of the product. More top matches than ever before will be broadcast. EHF Marketing GmbH has, to date, TV partners in 27 countries.



287 clubs took part in the 2006/2007 European Cup competitions. The EHF European Cup competitions have been at the heart of the European club competitions since the foundation of the European Handball Federation, the first European Cup champions were crowned in 1994.

The 2006/2007 season, with its EHF Champions League, EHF Cup, Cup Winners' Cup and Challenge Cup for both men and women saw a total of 728 matches. In the men's competition three German clubs topped the bill, with THW Kiel winning the EHF Champions League, SC Magdeburg the EHF Cup, HSV Hamburg the Cup Winners' Cup and UCM Resita (ROU) - a European newcomer - the Challenge Cup.

In the women's competition, four countries were represented on the medal table, Slagelse DT (DEN) – EHF Champions League, SC Zvezda Zvenigorod (RUS) – EHF Cup – another newcomer, HC "Naisa" Nis from Serbia – Challenge Cup and C.S. Oltchim RM Valcea from Romania in the Cup Winners' Cup.

At the time of going to press, the current season has currently seen 528 matches, with the crowning of the champions in May for the men's competitions and the women's competitions.

The branding of the competitions has also continued, with competition flags for each of the competitions and the European Cup website. The European Handball Federation strives to continue the development, which is certainly an exciting challenge with clubs from all corners of Europe.taking part.



Draw Highlights

The EHF has a wide compendium of events and competitions, falling under the EHF brand name. It goes without saying that draws are part of any competition just like the matches and the winners are. All draws are public events and the majority take place in the EHF Headquarters and are part of daily business. There are however also "special" draws which are true events and often mark special occasions. The highlights of 2007 were:

Men's EHF Euro Draw

The draw for the final round of the 2008 Men's EHF European Championship took place on 22nd June 2007 in the TV 2 Studios in Oslo, Norway. The Norwegian Handball Federation hosted the event as organiser of this top event in January 2008.

The draw was presented by EHF President Tor Lian. The studio in Oslo was packed for the draw, with over 200 people filling the studio. It was broadcast live on TV and streamed on the web. A TV signal was also available for news access.

Sixteen teams went into the final draw which determined where they would play their preliminary round matches and against whom during the 2008 event. The groups A-D will be played in Stavanger, Drammen, Bergen and Trondheim and the Championship will take place from 17th - 27th January 2008.

EHF Handball Champions League Gala

Over 300 guests were present in Vienna, the home of the EHF Headquarters, on the evening of Friday 29th June 2007 for an EHF Champions Gala, which was also broadcast live on the web and around the world – nigh on 30 TV companies took advantage of the signal.

Representatives from top clubs, top players and stars, EHF partners, TV and marketing partners, representatives from the field of refereeing and delegates and members of handball's media circles convened on Vienna to mark the 15th season of the EHF Champions League. The event came under the motto "celebrate the passion" and more information can be found on page 40/41.

The focus of the evening were the 2007/2008 Men's and Women's EHF Champions League Group Draws. Two of handball's biggest stars were in Vienna to draw the lots. The men's draw was drawn by two-time Champions League winner and 2006/2007 Top Scorer from THW Kiel, Nikola Karabatic. He was joined by Bojana Popovic, three times Champions League winner and the season's top scorer with Slagelse DT. Both players were awarded with a gold-plated EHF Champions League ball by longstanding partner adidas.











The 20th Men's World Handball Championship was held in Germany from the 19th January to the 4th February 2007. With a stunning finish in the Cologne Arena, the national host team of Germany took the title of World Champions.

EHF Events

8th EHF Conference of Presidents





Over 100 delegates from 48 European handball associations converged on Rome/ITA on Saturday 13th October for the 8th Conference of Presidents and Extraordinary Congress. 47 EHF Member Federations were represented, plus Kosovo as associated federation.

The morning was taken up by the Conference of Presidents, which is a crucial discussion forum for the European handball business and its future. In the afternoon, the EHF Extraordinary Congress took place, with delegates voting on the motions tabled. President Tor Lian, together with Vice-President Jean Brihault, chaired both the meetings. There were also opening speeches from FIGH President Purromuto and Italian Olympic Committee President Pescante.



Conference of Presidents

Following the traditional report by the President about the activities and business of the EHF over the past two years, stressing the increased media interest in the sport of handball, the delegates moved on to hear about the organisers and candidates of European events. The participants heard that 62 EHF events have been held by 34 different nations over the past 15 years. The nations which have hosted three or more major European events were then honoured. Awards went to Austria, Germany, Italy, Slovakia, Sweden and Turkey. Harijs Cebrikovs of Latvia was also honoured with a Special Award of Honour for his service and dedication to the sport of handball. The important matter of European Championship Qualifications for the EHF Euro Events formed a principle part of the morning's work, with delegates actively discussing this area in detail. Discussions centred primarily on a joint marketing package of EHF Euro qualification matches with the unanimous objective to "close the gap" between qualification matches and the actual EHF Euro Events in the whole of Europe and how to achieve this goal.

Other matches included a presentation on matters relating to international and European competitions.

Bilateral Agreements: The occasion was utilised to sign a number of agreements underlining the strong working relationship between nations. Slovakia became signatory to the Rinck Convention (convention on mutual recognition of coaching qualifications), Malta and Montenegro signed a SMART agreement (for development aid) and Portugal and Scotland became partners under the Foster Project, as did Switzerland and Liechtenstein (a partnership programme of support).







8th EHF Extraordinary Congress

Extraordinary Congress

The matters on the agenda for the Extraordinary Congress centred mainly around the structure of the European Handball Federation, this Congress can also be seen as being a preparatory event for the 2008 Ordinary Congress to take place in Vienna in September 2008.

The Congress delegates discussed the proposals motions in detail. It was voted in favour to establish a Beach Handball Commission of a Chairman and 4 members to come into effect following the 2008 Congress, where the election will take place.

The proposed introduction of associated experts into the EHF political mechanisms was narrowly rejected, achieving 64.24%, which is not an absolute majority. Therefore technical forums will not be introduced. Working Groups will continue to fall under the responsibility of the EHF Executive Committee in order to ensure the exchange of expertise.

Votes were also taken on arbitration regulations, which amount to the reorganisation of the juridical EHF bodies. The Congress voted positively to establish an Arbitration Tribunal (1st Instance), which is an independent elected body. The 2nd instance will then be a pool of arbitrators in the form of a Court of Appeal. Both are independent bodies. Due to these changes, the statutes relating to the administration of justice and the respective fees were also voted on and will therefore be revised. As far as European Championship Qualifications are concerned (see above) and following the constructive discussions in the morning session, it was agreed to send a questionnaire to all EHF Member Federation enquiring about the stance on the European Handball Championship Qualifications and the Congress delegated the responsibility of setting-up a Working Group to deal with this matter in detail to the EHF Executive Committee and due to time restrictions, an additional Extraordinary Congress will be called in order to put this matter to a vote, 26th January 2008 – the final weekend of Euro 2008 in Norway –was agreed upon.

Conclusion

All delegates used the weekend to hold important discussions with their counterparts from other countries. All were unanimous in thanking the Italian Handball Federation for their heartfelt hospitality. The Conference and Congress were held in a positive and constructive atmosphere for the sport of handball. The next Ordinary Congress will be on 26/27 September 2008 in Vienna, Austria.

5th EHF Conference for Secretaries General

Destination Team Play

5th EHF Conference for Secretaries General





The conference was a great opportunity for the sports managers to exchange their ideas and experience. The meeting was a forum to talk about the future of the game and about its continuing development. Various subjects were addressed during the two-day conference such as research and development, official's task training, Euro qualifications and final tournament, business operation, sport management training and product promotion.

The motto of conference was "Destination Team Play". It emphasised the possibility of all the parties involved in handball management on a European level to work together for the future of the game. The agenda was designed by the EHF Office with the goal of securing an effective cooperation between the parties involved in European handball. After topic presentations brainstorming crews were formed. The officials of various nationalities defined possible "destinations" or objectives together.

Michael Wiederer, Secretary General of the European Handball Federation, spoke on behalf of the organisers of the event:

"The EHF places great importance on keeping a tight working bond with its member federations and such events are essential. Those working on the management of handball on a daily basis meet to exchange ideas, experience and power the sport forward."

Apart from the formal obligations, the event was marked by its informal atmosphere that gave the possibility for national federation officials to discuss the daily matters just as the future of the game.







Courses EHF Events

One of the key elements in the area of Methods & Development within the European Handball Federation is the constant drive for knowledge and improvement. Since the initial Regional Course for Delegates took place in Kiev in 2005, the EHF has gone on to organise more courses over the past years. In 2007 this was no different. In all, four regional courses were organised.

The fourth edition of this educational sojourn for EHF Delegates took place in **Kemer, Turkey from the 10th -13th May 2007**. Taking place for the first time in Mediterranean, 18 participants from across 9 nations joined 3 EHF Lecturers for a course that, as part of the agenda, featured topics such as security and safety aspects, stress management amongst others things.

The second course of the year, the **5th EHF Regional Course for Handball Delegates** took place in Skaerbaek, Denmark, from 25-28 May 2007. This kind of course was also a first for the organisers in Scandinavia. Here, the EHF educational staff focused on issues such as Communication, Cooperation and Conflict in addition to authority and event management amongst others.

In the late summer, the **EHF Lecturers went to Balatonfüred, Hungary** to conduct the 6th EHF Regional Course for Handball Delegates that took place from 30 August to 2 September 2007. Twenty-two participants over four days discussed the interpretation of the rules of the game at major competitions. Expectation, perception and realities which included a TAIS test were also on the agenda.

The final delegates' course of 2007 **returned for the second time to Rotterdam** in the Netherlands. The 7th EHF Regional Course for Handball Delegates took place from 18 -21 October 2007. For the participants, interesting and important topics such as observations and evaluations, the difficulties that the delegates face during a tournament and the psychological aspects involved were amongst many more topics on the programme. This course was held in conjunction with the Referee Course for Candidates (see page 54-56).

Within the framework of the Women's 19 European Championship in Turkey, the THF organised the **2007 EHF Youth Coaches' Course**. The 9th edition of this event welcomed 65 participants from 10 European nations and with guest participants from India, Iraq and Japan. The course focused on training younger players in defence whilst upholding the spirit of fair play; improving strength without losing coordination. These lectures were combined with practical exercise.

In keeping with the EHF educational agenda, multiple courses for 2008 are already in the advanced developmental stage.

Workshops & Working Groups

Beach European Championships Workshop

Due to a change in the playing system, the 2007 edition of the Men's and Women's European Beach Handball Championships took place on the Italian coast from the 10th – 15th July 2007 (see pages 11-12 for more details). Leading up to this top summer event two workshops covering the organisational bases took place. The first workshop was held in Rome, with a venue inspection taking place in Misano Adriatico. The second workshop took place at the EHF Headquarters in Vienna. Competition Commission member Jesus Guerrero undertook the inspections of the venue which provided the basis for the workshops. Key points on this agenda were the promotional concept, TV, Live Streaming and Match Videos and naturally the Fair Play initiatives.

EHF Men's Champions League Seasonal Round-Up

In May 2007 a seasonal round-up for all men's Champions League clubs was organised by EHF Marketing GmbH for the first time. The meeting took place in Vienna at the Gartenhotel Altmannsdorf. The aim of this meeting was to give all the clubs the opportunity to give their impressions, opinions and to make modification suggestions immediately after the season. EHF Marketing GmbH took this chance to provide the clubs with the necessary information regarding the upcoming season. Topics such as the new playing and advertising systems as well as the innovative floor model, etc were discussed.

EHF Women's Champions League Workshop

The EHF Women's Champions League Workshop hosted at the Gartenhotel Altmannsdorf on 24 January 2007 was a look to the future for the representatives of the women's Champions League clubs. Firstly EHF Marketing GmbH gave a status report to all the clubs about the TV and media situation; the current advertising situation as well as the financial position were also examined. Based on this status report, a discussion on topics such as the new marketing situation, playing system as well as the floor and branding project was initiated.

Marketing Supervisor Workshop

This years Marketing Supervisor Workshop took place at Arcotel Wimberger on the 27th August 2007. Due to of the changes to the playing system implemented at the beginning of the 2007/2008 EHF Men's Champions League season, EHF Marketing GmbH decided to increase their pool of marketing supervisors. Over 40 participants comprising of both new and existing Marketing Supervisors were invited to this workshop. The agenda was built around the feedback received from the club representatives and the supervisors regarding the previous season. Topics focused on and included the partnership with Sportfive and the advertising situation, TV situation, Media, official Champions League floor, branding and administrative matters. It was also a good opportunity for our "new" team members to obtain opinions from their colleagues who already have experience in this sector.

Anti-Doping Meeting

In May 2007, a small delegation consisting of the chairmen of the EHF Methods and Competitions Commissions and the senior managers from EHF Competitions welcomed Mr. Hans Holdhaus of the IHF Methods Commission and a member of the IMSB to the EHF Headquarters in Vienna to discuss key issues facing handball today. This working group convened to research steps that could bring the anti-doping initiatives forward and find ways to implement the anti-doping measures. The anti-doping bodies welcomed the decision of the Executive Committee at their meeting in July in Italy.

EHF Euro Qualifications Working Group

November 2007 saw the members of the ECh Euro Qualifications Working Group convene for their first meeting in Vienna. The group, chosen by the Executive Committee based on a Congress resolution, are in place to working group to look at the conditions of the qualifications and to present a proposal to the Executive Committee who will in turn work out a new motion to be presented at the 9th Extraordinary Congress in Lillehammer in January 2008. This meeting hammered out the finer details of the areas from the original proposal to be reworked. The ECh Euro Qualifications Working Group will reconvene in 2008.

Workshops & Working Groups

Beach Handball Task Force

In 2007, the EHF Beach Handball Task Force comprising of Laszlo Sinka (ExeC), Jesus Guerrero (CC), Ton van Linder (MC) and Peter Fröschl (EHF), met to discuss all issues relating to the progress of beach handball; just one of the areas of the handball discipline which has continued to rapidly develop. The Task Force convened in Vienna on two occasions and within the framework of the 2007 European Beach Handball Championships for Men and Women, met in Misano Adriatico/ITA.

All meetings covered a range of topics, the first meeting in particular dealt with the organisational aspects of the 2007 Beach Handball EChs, and the introduction and the backing of a Youth Beach Handball Championships. The European Beach Tour featured heavily on the agenda of all Task Force meetings; from the publication of the promotional folder that was distributed to over 500 Beach Handball enthusiasts. The 2007 EBT consisted of a record number of teams that was followed by the EBT 06 Masters that took place in Hungary; this proved that with the improvements shown in both competitions that the wheels of development continued to harmoniously turn.

Also a key topic of the meeting was in the area of didactic instruction. The Beach Handball Task Force put together numerous publications in various formats that were distributed far and wide in the handball sphere. Hoping to increase the number of courses pertaining to all beach handball areas in 2008, the Beach Handball Task Force will reassemble in the New Year.

Education Group

Since 2005 the EHF internal Education Group consisting of Jan Tuik (CC Chairman), Frantisek Taborsky (MC Chairman), Sandor Andorka (CC Member - Refereeing) and Wolfgang Pollany (MC Member – Education and Further Training) have dealt with all educational issues surrounding referees and delegates within the EHF competitions system. Based on an Executive Committee resolution, the new EHF Refereeing Structure was implemented in 2007. The Education Group were responsible for the organisation of the three EHF Referee Candidate courses that took place in addition to the EHF Officials' Conferences that were held in Slovakia, Turkey and Sweden on the edges of the Younger Age Category competitions. On the agendas of the three Education Group meetings, that took place in Vienna, encompassed various topics. In 2008, the Education Group will continue to make positive key changes in this area of handball.

European Championship Workshops – Norway / FYR Macedonia / Austria The European Championships are the strongest competition in the repertoire of the European Handball Federation and the organisation of such an event takes years. From the bidding and allocation process to the final tournament thousands of man hours are spent poring over the numerous intricate details in order to present a spectacular competition that attracts spectators in the 10's of thousands and TV viewers in their millions.

Key aspects of EURO organisation are the workshops that are structured at regular intervals with the organising committee of the hosting nation. For the men's European Championship in Norway in January 2008, five workshops, 2 site visits that included in-depth technical assessment of the venues and numerous meetings and discussions have occurred between the EHF "EURO Events" staff and the LOC. These workshops encompass various EURO fields from financing to flooring and venues to VIP services. For the forthcoming women's and men's European Championships in FYR Macedonia and Austria respectively, several workshops and various meetings have already taken place.

EHF Youth Forum

Based on a decision by the EHF Executive Committee on May 3, 2007, the EHF called the EHF Youth Forum, a temporary EHF Expert Group that was installed as one of the follow-up measures from 2006 EHF Youth Handball Convention. Under the chairmanship of Allan Lund (EHF MC), the EHF Youth Forum met in June 2007 for a 2-day intensive working session at the EHF Office in Vienna. Comprising of Helena Crnojevic – CRO, Mads Hovgaard – DEN, Cristina Nastase – ROU, Gregor Pecovnik - SLO, Milan Petronijevic – SRB, Natasha Engberg – SWE and with the assistance of additional EHF staff members, the group treated two major and different issues: 'Handball at school' (covered by 'Basic Handball', 'Handball in school' and 'the 4 dimensions of teaching handball in school') and 'Rules of the Game' (expressed in a simplified rulebook). A promotional website for children is in progress.

EHF Events

Meetings

Union Sportive Des Polices D'Europe

The 2nd Conference of Police Sports took place in Lausanne/FRA. Jan Tuik, Executive Committee Member and the CC Chairman represented the EHF at this meeting. On the agenda was the use of new technology in sports, utilisation of local police for crowd control at large events and the liability of sports leaders amongst many other interesting topics. The Union Sportive Des Polices D'Europe encourages sport throughout the European Police Forces and coordinates organisation of international competitions in all sports disciplines. The association also aims to build social and cooperative relations between European Police Forces. The European Handball Federation signed an agreement of cooperation with the USPE in 2004.

EMSA / European Masters Games Association

In August 2007 the representatives of the European Handball Federation met with the various members of the European sporting community for a meeting with the European Masters Games Association (EMGA) that is responsible for organising the first multi-sport competition for older professional veteran athletes. In cooperation with the European Masters Sports Association (EMSA), the European organisation responsible for the bidding and placing of the games, autumn 2008 will see the very first games held in Malmö/SWE.

European Team Sports Federations

The federation was created to be a platform for the exchange of knowledge and experience on basic common issues between the European Team Sports. The leaders of the team sport member federations (CEV/EHF/FIBA/FIRA-AER/IIHF/UEFA) held their annual meeting in Nyon/SUI at the UEFA headquarters in the spring of 2007. The main topic on the agenda was the European White Paper on Sport.

European Olympic Committees (EOC)

The EHF met representatives of the European Olympic Committees on two occasions in 2007. In continued efforts to improve and expand the sport of handball, the two governing bodies signed an "Agreement of Collaboration" in connection with the EOC - European Summer Sports Federations Project of Agreement. In September 2007, representative from the EHF Additional Activities department were in Tampere for the first working session for the 2009 European Olympic Youth Festival. For the first time in Tampere/FIN, the competition will take place with both boys and girls born in the years 1993 and 1992 respectively.

EU Commission

The key sporting issue that has affected European sport federations across the board was the publication of the EU White Paper on Sport. For European team sports, this led to increased communication between the federations and the European Commission. The paper, amongst other things, aims to bring more legal stability to sport in Europe. In the final quarter of the year, EHF Vice President Jean Brihault represented the interests of the European Handball Federation at the EU Commission meeting that took place in Brussels in October.



Transfers

The transfers department of the EHF has made considerable progress in this area over the past years. The ever increasing amount of work has seen obligatory changes made to the transfer regulations, which were necessary for the integrity of the sport and the players. All the business of transfers that is undertaken within the European Handball Federation is conducted in accordance with the International Transfer System based on IHF regulations.


In 2007, there has been a substantial increase in the number of international transfers within Europe. This rise can be linked to the international activity during the pre-Olympic period, a trend that has been observed for the best part of a decade.

Almost every year some European Federations face the difficult situations regarding the playing eligibility of a player who is the subject of a current international transfer. In 2007, there was some obscurity in this area; with players having a valid contract in a club and who then went to another team in different country and continuing their handballing activity. Regulations were contravened, over and above the oscillation within the European clubs, meant the European Handball Federation intervening and concluding respective transfer cases through the EHF Body of 1st Instance.


At the Executive Committee meeting in September 2007, having dealt with the area of transfers that gave cause for concern and in order to bring clarification to the specific issue, it was decided that in all forms and types of competitions / matches, the players are permitted to play only when in the possession of an official and valid National Licence and the National Licence may be issued only after obtaining the official International Transfer Certificate registered and confirmed by the EHF.

There were an increasing number of transfers in the specific category of students and in order to offer more opportunity to those handball players that are at the same time studying and are registered with well-known programmes such as 'ERASMUS', 'da VINCI', 'SOCRATES', etc; the transfer administration fees were waived. For the students to be eligible a document from the respective university, proving current student status and membership to the programme concerned has to be presented upon issuance of the transfer certificate. At this time, the waiver of fees is not open to those students who are playing on a 1st or 2nd league club level.

Since the implementation of Education Compensation rules, there were in 2007 fewer cases relating to non-agreement than in the previous year.

Methods & Developments

The area of methods and development at the European Handball Federation spreads out over many different areas. Since the foundation of the EHF back in 1991, many tasks, projects and initiatives have been successfully realised, with the bulk of EHF Member Federations, whether big or small, profiting in some shape and form.

The majority of the projects and initiatives in this area are not limited or restricted to the space of just one year, they span across a much longer period of time, with long-term goals and objectives in sight.

The tasks evolve in line with the development of the sport and due to the rapid changes in new technologies, the innovations and the tools used to realise the set goals undergo continuous change and are being analysed at all time.

Handball from the Roots

The EHF produced a publication in 2007, under the title of "Grassroot HandballToolkit". The kit is designed to offer a compendium of ideas, advice and tips to all those at the grassroots of the sport, whether it be mini-handball or just handball for fun. In 2008 the system will be web-based, making it accessible to all.

Handball at School

The EHF Youth Handball Forum met in June 2007 and one of the points on their agenda was to look at the issue of Handball in School. The New Year will see the re-ignition of the project as the second comprehensive package, which will incorporate the summer camps and shoot-outs, is planned for 2008. The EHF places great emphasis on the development of handball in youngsters from an early age. Handball has never been so popular amongst school-aged children, who look up to the handball stars, hoping to be one of them on day in the future. The EHF has programmes to assist teachers and youth leaders in working with young, active and talented young children.

Wheelchair Handball

After the success of the demonstration in 2005, the area of Methods and Development have continued in their concerted efforts to make handball a sport for all. Due to interest expressed and the feedback received, the European Handball Federation has planned the first Wheelchair Handball Tournament to take place in 2008.

Material Support

The past year has seen unremitting steps being made in the area of development. The EHF has continually supported its Member Federations in the area of equipment that saw over 1000 handballs, 50 beach handballs, 2 beach handball goals and 5 lecturer nominations donated to those nations making positive advancements improving handball in their corner of Europe.







Methods & Developments

The "Rinck" Convention

Within the framework of the 8th Conference of Presidents in Italy, Slovakia became the 15th signatory to the RINCK Convention. From its conception in the spring of 2000 in Tel Aviv (ISR) the principle of this summit has been the reciprocated recognition of coaches' education in European Handball; facilitating the direct admission to practice in the signatory Member Federations. Slovakia joins AUT, BUL, CRO, CZE, DEN, FRA, GER, HUN, NOR, POL, POR, RUS, SLO and SWE in this significant delegation.

ENSSEE

The Review of the EU 5-level structure for the recognition of Coaching Qualifications has been completed by the European Coaching Council (a sub-committee of the European Network of Sports Science, Education and Employment - ENSSEE). Coaching delegates at the Forum have been asked to formally support the adoption of the Convention on behalf of their organisations in the form of a signed document. It is proposed that the relevant national authorities and the international federations sign up to a Coaching Convention for the recognition of coaching competence and qualifications

The Convention for the Recognition of Coaching Competence and Qualifications will represent an agreement between agencies/organisations to work together on the further development of the Framework for Coaching Competence and Qualifications. It is not a legally binding convention and it is not seeking formal national support from EU member states at this point. In case of EHF Executive Committee approval, a commitment shall be signed by the EHF and sent to ENSSEE.

SMART Project

The administrative event in Italy was also the setting for forging new partnerships and cementing relations between the European handball nations. With two new signatures to the SMART accord for development support the project was transformed once again. In 2007, the agreements with the nations of Albania, Azerbaijan and Moldova came to a successful close. The European Handball Federation continues to support Armenia, Bulgaria, England and Scotland and welcomes Malta and Montenegro as the new signatories.

Foster Project

The FOSTER project progressed in 2007 with the addition of Portugal and Scotland as well as Switzerland and Liechtenstein signing supportive partnership agreements. Based on solidarity, the department of Methods and Development pair well-developed handball national federations with those nations that welcome the valued support of more experienced countries.

Cooperation between AUT-LTU, DEN-BUL, HUN-LAT, NED-IRL, NOR-GEO, ROU-MDA continue to flourish.




The 2007 EHF Congress ratified numerous motions that will bring vast change to the federation in 2008. The company welcomes the addition of the Beach Handball Commission, comprising of a Chairman and four members that will come into force in September 2008 at the 9th EHF Ordinary Congress. The juridical bodies of the European Handball Federation will also undergo vast change as an elected body that will function as an Arbitration Tribunal and an independent Arbitration Court selected from a pool of Arbitrators that will be introduced in the autumn of 2008.

With the assistance of 26 full and part time staff members working, in harmony with the 6 staff members from the daughter company – EHF Marketing GmbH, at the EHF Headquarters in Vienna, the daily business, planning and organisation of all events is undertaken with great care on behalf of the EHF Member Federations, clubs and individuals, in particular, the sportsmen and sportswomen of Europe.

As handball continues to grow within and beyond Europe, the European Handball Federation and its league of committees and commissions continue in their demanding role, making the decisions that have brought the strong position where it is today.






